Jones was well coached in Penn State's style of wrestling but one of Black's new holds almost scored a fall for him. However, another three points were added to Penn State's total when the referee awarded Black the decision with a time advantage of 2 minutes and 10 seconds.

Parthorne did good work in his match with Howard, the Nittany 135-pounder securing a decision with a time advantage of three minutes. The match was decided a draw at the end of the regulation time and the bout was forced to two extra periods. On two occasions in the overtime Parthorne almost scored a fall.
