President of Gettysburg College Gives Opening Talk Before Gathering Tonight

One hundred representatives from counties at West Point, Hagerstown of the Lutheran student association of America will open their convocation at State College with an address by Dr. W. A. Hanson.

Dr. Hanson will speak on "What Lutherans Can Contribute to Modern Life." Following this introductory address an hour will be devoted to games and a social get-together of the delegates.

Dr. S. Lehman, 25, president of the Penn State branch, has arranged to take all visitors to the State wide meeting which will be held in the afternoon.

This will be followed by a discussion of means of assisting the National Lutheran council in relieving the distress among Lutherans in foreign lands and to provide a scholarship for a Lutheran student in India.
