 Charley Kell who put up a game fight last Saturday against his Navy opponent is under doctor's care and the 160 pound position will be filled by Greene who makes his debut as a Nittany fighter. Greene has been improving steadily in practice and is expected to prove strong opposition to Tomson of V. M. I. who has won two out of four bouts for the Virginians.

In the seventy pound class, Hastings will attempt a comeback against either Kelly or Ryan, who have alternated between 175 and the unlimited class for the cadets. Lou Fritts is entered in the heavyweight division, and will probably exchange blows with Ryan of V. M. I.

As a team, the southern fighters have met four opponents, hanging up two victories, one defeat and one draw. At the beginning of the season the V. M. I. seniors exchanged wagers with the University of Virginia fighters the encounter resulting in a 3 to 2 score. The same University of Virginia team managed to defeat Coach Houck's proteges in the first Lion meet of the year.

In their second meet, the cadets defeated the Catholic university by a 4 to 1 score in a closely contested encounter. The meet was tied up until the last hour which Catholic university had to forfeit for lack of an entry. The University of North Carolina was next met by the V. M. I. fistmen and overwhelmed by a 6 to 1 count. In the

next contest the tables were reversed and the southerners were sent down to a 7 to 0 defeat at the hands of the Army boys who are scheduled to meet the Nittany scrappers next Saturday at West Point.
