Orange Yearlings Tackle

At the start of the second frame, a charged lineup took the floor for the Nittany freshmen. Boote jumping center and VonNiela taking the right forward post. Lambert, the Salt City center got the ball after tip-off and evading Boote and the Lion guards, scored his first field goal of the game. After hard scrambling, Green took a pass from Lambert, making another two-pointer for the Orange. Boote made good two foul tries and Lambert again got hold of the ball, broke from cover and, unimpeded, sent the sphere through the hoop for an additional double-pointer.

After the Syracuse center got rebound of Boote to score a pretty field goal. Kibb sent Cy Langeron to the goal post. The Orange defense was working perfectly, allowing the Penn State quintet but two foul goals by Slate and Langeron, while Lambert put two free tosses through the basket bringing the score to 26-16. Boote went back into the fray for VonNiela and Eimas took the floor for the Syracuse cadet when Captain Maister was ruled out of the melee on personals.

Slate made good a penalty from the foul line, which was followed by Eimas' two free tosses through the hoop for the Orange. Lambert again got free to shoot his fifth double-doubling of the half. After a fast scrimmage, Cy Langeron passed to Boote who scored the only Nittany field goal of the second period. The encounter ended when Boote sent one of two foul tries through the basket for the last Lion tally, making the final count 29 to 29 in favor of Coach Killinger's yearlings.

The Orange-clad Okun and Freddy Kaiser, bearing the Blue and White colors, were the leads in the first act. The wiry 115-pounders wasted no time in preliminaries, Kaiser taking his opponent to the mat seven seconds after the hand-shake and keeping him there until the bell rang down the curtain at nine minutes. Though Kaiser kept his man busy during the whole performance and made a desperate try for a fall during the last minute, the Syracuse Representative showed a fine brand of defensive tactics and Kaiser had to be content with a decision on a time advantage of 8 minutes 53 seconds.

Orange Captain Losses

The most desperate encounter of the meet occurred when Gus Lohman went in against Jeffries, captain of the Syracuse team in the place of Chapman, who was injured at Cornell. Lohman took Jeffries to the mat with a tricky shift, reminiscent of Naito's tactics of last year, but within a half-minute the chunky Orange leader was on his feet again, scrapper than ever. Though Gus had an edge on the Syracuse lad, he was powerless to secure a fall as Jeffries put up a ferocious defense throughout, squirming boss at the end of the bout and opening up a starting offense as the bell rang. Before Bennett gave Gus the hour on an advantage of 4 minutes 32 seconds.

Sands, filling Walt Liggett's place as the Nittany representative in the 155-pound division, had another tough battle on his hands when he met De Leon. Sands outwitted his opponent by almost ten pounds, De Leon having been shifted from his original 125-pound berth. The Lion grappler also held a four inch advantage in height, but the Syracuse entry displayed one of the fastest defensive defenses through-out the Army mats this year and succeeded in holding Sands to a decision on an advantage of 1 minute 53 seconds.

Orange Gets Fall

The only reversal to the Nittany fortunes came in the 145-pound bout when Warner of Syracuse took Long for a fall in 5 minutes 45 seconds. At the start of the bout the lads looked evenly matched, neither gaining a decided advantage, but at four minutes Long fell into a three-quarter nelson on the edge of the mats. The referee brought the men back into the square and Long was saved temporarily from a sure fall. A minute later, however, Warner rammed his opponent's shoulders to the mat with a quarter nelson and a body hold.

Manning, in Johnnie Parham's 138-pound berth, added a well-earned three points to the Nittany score when he took a decision in extra periods from

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When a new man on the Syracuse team with a 5 minutes 28 seconds time through. It was a loose bout, Manning several times almost securing a fall only to have the Orangeman slide out of a hold. In the extra six minutes Manning had everything his own way.

Rumbough Wins Fall

After maneuvering with Davis, an 175-pounder advanced to the 175-pound decision, for over a minute and a half, Sam Rumbough brought his bout to a whirlwind finish when he took the Syracuse grappler to the mat with a shoulder hold, shifted to a crouch and head hold and pinned Davis' shoulders to the mat in a total time of 2 minutes 59 seconds.

Jules Prevost put on a more leisurely exhibition in panning MacNamara, another devotee of the gridiron, to the cloth. Though Jules outweighed his man by about fifteen pounds and had the advantage from the start, he had trouble in finding a winning hold and finally got the tap on the back only fourteen seconds before the bout was scheduled to end.

seen him the judges' verdict. In the 145 pound bit, Captain Jack Wert entered the ring for the Blue and White against Lynch of the cadet team. Jack opened with a left jab to the head, followed by a right. Lynch landed to Wert's head and Jack countered with a right as the V. M. I. fistman missed a right. After an exchange of blows, Jack counted a left and right to the head, running his adversary back to him.

Wert Uses Uppercut

In the second frame, Wert had his famous uppercut working perfectly, landing telling swags to the southerner's jaw. Jack crossed a hard right to the head followed by lefts and rights to the head and a right uppercut to the jaw. A stiff left and a hard right had the cadet in a daze and almost when the bell ended the bout.

Wert again took the aggressive in the third period, landing lefts and

rights to Lynch's head. After a clinch, Jack unleashed a hard right uppercut to the chin followed by a left and right to the head and a hard right hook. The cadet blocked an uppercut to the pit of the stomach and a left to the head. Lynch countered with a left jab and received a left and right to the head as the round ended. The judges disagreed and the referee ordered a fourth round to determine the winner.

Wert started right off to win with a left to the head. Lynch's right hook was answered with two rights. After a clinch, Jack brought in his uppercut to the chin and then crossed his right to the jaw. Wert landed two right hooks and uppercuts to the body and head, while Lynch retaliated with a left and right to the head as the bell sounded. The judges' decision named Wert as the winner.

Zerbe Wins

Hastings, fighting in the forty-five pound class for the first, White and Yellow, was Tom Zerbe's opponent in the fourth tilt of the evening. Following an exchange of lefts which ended in a clinch, Zerbe sent two rights to Hastings' head which jarred him. The V. M. I. man started numerous lefts and rights to Tom's head, but Tom used his speed to an advantage and the blows landed on thin air.

The final round found the V. M. I. man rushing Tom but he couldn't make his blows count, while Zerbe scored a left and right to the head that pushed the southerner to the ropes. After another left to the jaw, Tom's hard left to the head drew blood. Hastings exchanged a right for a left as the seto ended, with Zerbe as the judges' choice for the winner.

In the 160 pound class, Cowboy Greene entered the squared circle for Penn State against Jamerson of V. M. I. The Lion boxer took the aggressive

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
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
