Ten minutes after play started the score stood 17-1 with Penn State holding the line tily.

Penn State staged a rally after Hanson's opening field basket in the middle of the first half and held the Orange men tally for 13-1, but the half closed with the New Yorkers twelve points in the lead 21-11. Gerhardt was responsible for six of the Nittany counters.

Team Reversers

In the second half the two teams seemed equal matched the Lion quintet including its old team-work and only when an attack that kept six or seven on the jump Gerhardt and Hanson each making up two field shots and a pair of points from the foul line with Me-Vicker rushed through with a pair of double-doubles from the floor giving the Blue and White a count of 16 for the period. **Fraternity Campaign**

The campaign committee wishes to state that the purpose in assessing each fraternity as a single unit is to simplify the work of the canvassers. While it is desirable that the entire chapter subscribe as a whole, it is not necessary that any number be able to contribute be issued.

**Gift Offer Aid**

Organizing a committee and conducting this drive in a manner similar to the men the Co-eds are working independently on their campaign to raise their quota. Miss M. B. Chambers '26 will act as chairman for the women students with Miss C. C. Cannon '27, Miss B. S. Chaffin '26, Miss S. D. Sheridan '27 and Miss E. B. Pomroy '28 as assistants.

The alumni have not yet been told of the campaign but it is soon as the students complete their work. Dr. M. Casca had the advantage during the entire second three minutes however, and was awarded the decision with a time of 2 minutes 54 seconds.

Taking down to the mat with an arm lock Manning scored the first fall of the meet, wrestling in the 155-pound berth usually filled by Parthe-mone several times during the bout he scored a takedown of the tap from Referee Bennett but it was not until six minutes of the period were over that he put across the final touches with a head lock.
