Whipping his team into shape by daily practice games on New Beaver field, Coach Glenn Killinger is preparing his batsmen for the opening game with Juniata to be played at Huntingdon on Saturday afternoon. FRESHMEN INSTRUCTION WEEK IS RECOMMENDED TO SENATE

Council of Administration Decides That First-Year Men Require Special Attention During Period Preceding Opening of College—System Used With Success at Maine

Recognizing the freshmen's need of acclimating himself with college life before he begins his Penn State career, the Council of Administration, at a special meeting held on Thursday evening, March twenty-sixth, voted to recommend to the Senate that a freshmen week be held just before the opening of college next fall. The suggestion was approved by Dean R. L. Schmitt.

The recommendation will be voted upon by the Senate on the third Thursday of next month. The suggestion is recommended by the Council of Administration will require the men who have been at college in the various departments to arrive at the college a week in advance of the opening of the first day is devoted to registration and the rest of the period will be taken up in making the freshmen familiar with their surroundings. They will have a chance to learn the location of the various buildings and also become thoroughly acquainted with their "bible."

In addition to becoming adapted to the new surroundings the first-year men will be given instructions regarding the use of the library. They will also be instructed as to the requirements of their respective courses. Under this program the future success of the freshman class would "know the ropes" in the time classes started and could then utilize his full time in the pursuit of his studies.

The program would be based on the one which has proved successful at the University of Maine. The first day at the University of Maine is devoted to registration and the remainder of the week is taken up in instructing the newcomers in the various phases of college life. The following are the subjects which were taken up at Maine: State taking and examinations, use of the library, use of books, college duties and responsibilities, the three colleges of the university, the college student's daily work, college customs, cultural activities, current university problems, honor societies, hygiene and physical training, social conduct, chemistry and the higher obligations of life.
