NEW DRAMA FRIDAY

"Children of the Moon," a Three-Act Tragedy, Is Selected as Anniversary Number

MOONMADNESS FORMS
BASIS OF STRONG PLOT

Presenting the powerful three act drama, "Children of the Moon" by Martin Plavin, in the Auditorium Friday evening, the Penn State Players will celebrate the fifth anniversary of their organization. This will mark the first performance of the tragedy since its original production in the Comedy Theatre in New York City, where it scored a sensational success.

The play contains a strong plot regarding unusual hypnotic ability and exceptional acting. When it first appeared it was favorably compared with the great tragedies of Ibsen. Throughout the drama in all of its mystery over shadows the action although it is not essentially a mystery play.

Moonmadness Is Theme
Moonmadness, a form of insanity caused by the earth's satellite, is the basis of the plot. Presenting a clash between the selfish mother filled with maternal jealousy and the calm, sensible grandmother, Madame Atherton, the drama portrays the ability of the cunning, affectionate mother to ruin the lives of those close to her.

The cast which will face the audience on Friday evening is an excellent one, composed of experienced performers all of whom have appeared in previous Penn State productions. Miss Dorothy Musser '27 carries the leading role of Judith Atherton the mother while Miss Laddie Giesel '28 plays the part of the grandmother.

Miss M. D. Reed '28 has an opportunity for displaying unusual acting ability as the daughter, the last of the Athertons. R. A. Wilson '28 in the leading male role Major Barnstet, and N. D. Zimmerman '27 as Judge Atherton who foresees his family and lives in the imaginary world of the moon, also carry difficult roles.

Convention Held
A C. Clough director of the production has expressed his satisfaction with the work of the actors. An entirely new setting has been provided and a special five piece program will be given as a souvenir.

Representatives of the Little Theatres of all Pennsylvania's colleges have been invited to attend the performance, and on Saturday afternoon a conference, sponsored by the Penn State Players, will be held for the purpose of forming a state organization of amateur play producing groups. Over twenty institutions have signified their intention of sending delegates to this convention.

Season's Review

Taking every meet on its regular schedule and topping off its vicissitudes with the capture of the Intercollegiate Championship crown, the Nittany wrestling team closed a season last week that will probably stand unexcelled in the future history of the sport at Penn State.

At a meeting last week, letter awards were made for nine men on the squad and to Minister R. E. Fehr. As Intercollegiate athletes, Captain Len Cary, Ed Lizzett, Bill Black, and Johnnie Parthomore will each receive a star from the University. A special award of the varsity honor was made for Russ Lehman while Oster, Manning, Rumbraugh and Prevost will get the regular ones.

Coach Leonard started intensive training immediately after Christmas vacation with four men from last year's squad on the mat, Captain Cary, Fehr, Parthomore and Rumbraugh. The 125-pound, 175-pound and the unlimited divisions were the only classes. Left victory and the Nittany mat meeting good-naturedly capable men for these positions.

Take Every Meet
The Penn State team held the lid of its season on January twenty-six, each handling the Allegheney matmen a 3-0 defeat with a fall and a decision. The bye-up which entered this meet was predicted the same which carried off the Intercollegiate title a week ago. Captain Cary at 175 pounds, Lehman at 125, Lizzett at 135, Black at 175, Manning at 175, Rumbraugh at 165 and Fehr, Prevost in the unlimited division. Manning was later replaced.

By Parthomore, one of the present championship titleholders. Parthomore was the second victim of the Lion wrestlers when in the mid-semester meet, the Blue and White scored a mother shut out, routing the Quaker City side with a tally of 29-0. On February fourth the Penn State team traveled to Illinois and downed Council with a count of 20-5 after several close tussles. Oster, in the 125-pound class, was one of the stars of the fray.

Lehigh Meet Close
Lehigh held the Lion's tappers to the closest score of the season on the mat week-end, routing the contest with the tally of 10-11. In their meet with Lehigh on February twenty-ninth however, the Blue and White team got back into the high-scoring habit with an easy 22-5 win over the Orange matmen. Only two tappers entered the meet.

The team secured one of the most brilliant victories of the year on March tenth when it met Navy at Annapolis. It rolled up an 18-9 score, the worst defeat the Middle has suffered in a dozen years. Bookend Polvetch the first team on the regular card proved an easy victim for the Nittany seven, going down to the tune of 24-1 before a team including only three tappers.

Securing four Intercollegiate championships and retaining their 1924 mat

DR. R. A. GORTNER TO
SPEAK HERE SATURDAY

Dr. R. A. Gortner, head of the department of agriculture and biochemistry of the University of Minnesota, will speak here on Saturday at four o'clock in Room 119 Old Mining Building. His subject will be "Bloodhells in the Living Processes." Dr. Gortner's research brought to Penn State under the auspices of Phil L. Mohr's "Bloodhells" honorarium chemistry fraternity of which he was president last year.

He was research chemist for the Carnegie Institute of Research at Cold Spring Harbor, Long Island. While there he worked on chemistry in relation to heredity and later he went to the University of Minnesota to act as chief research chemist of some exciting most of his time to research matter.

Dr. Gortner has done much in the field of bloodhells and the chemistry of proteins and is now an authority in this line. He has done considerable research work in the colloidal chemistry of staining and baking, and has made a study of the factors influencing the baking strength of flours.
