Silverstein and Company of Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania, have been secured by the committee to decorate the big auditorium hall for the affair...

Color Scheme New: Black and white, together with many glowing tints of sunset trading in and out among the draperies...

From this huge design, long drapes of the same colors, alternated, will be hung from the edges of the center-board to the walls at a height of ten feet from the floor...

Hangings from each white black in the centerboard, and extending downward for five feet, lights will be placed. Each light will be shadowed by short streamers of sunlight surrounding it...

Booths will be separated by alternating black and white drapes. Supported by braces, a series of lattice will roof each compartment...

Floor Space: Drawings for fraternity floor space will be held immediately following the return from the Easter vacation...
