county in 1881 and president of Juniata college, his Alma Mater in 1907. He left the latter position in 1905 to become superintendent of public schools of Philadelphia which position he held until he began his term as Governor of Pennsylvania in 1915.

Dr. Bumbaugh is a member of the National Education Association, the Historical Society of Pennsylvania, the Pennsylvania German Society and the Pennsylvania Historical Society. He was professor of pedagogy at the University of Pennsylvania from 1897 to 1900 and from 1902 to 1906. He served also as a member of the State Board of Education from 1911 to 1917.

He is the author of the following books: "History of the Presbyterian Church in Pennsylvania," "Standard Texts (5 vols.) with J. S. Walton," "Stories of Pennsylvania History," "The Making of a Teacher," and "The Story of Roosevelt." He is the editor of the Lippincott Educational Series and of the "Sunday School Times."
