DR. F. L. PATTEE SPEAKS IN OLD CHAPEL TONIGHT

Liberal Arts Lecturer Will Take Lafcadio Hearn as Subject of Evening's Address

Lafcadio Hearn, a striking personality in the English literature of the late nineteenth century, will be the subject of a lecture to be given by Dr. F. L. Pattee tonight at seven o'clock in Old Chapel. This will be the third lecture in the Liberal Arts Lecture Course series.

Lafcadio Hearn, the son of an Englishman and a native Greek, was born June 27, 1850, in Santa Maria, Ionian Islands. He received his education in England and then came to America where he engaged in journalistic work in Cincinnati and New Orleans. In 1880 Mr. Hearn went to Japan, adopting that country as his native land. He has traveled extensively, especially in the East. His works are: "Out of the West Indies," "Glimpses of Unfamiliar Japan," "Some Chinese Sketches" and "Strange Leaves from Strange Literature."
