Cornell and Syracuse Down Lions on Trip—Snow Covers Field for Ithaca Meet

NITTANY PASSERS SCORE IN GAME WITH ONONDAGA

Although the Penn State passers from last both trips on the northern trip to Cornell and Syracuse, the Nittany passers showed a decided improvement in the attack and defensive work which met the approval of Coach Leonard. The rest of the week will be spent in grooming the Lion passers for the clash with the Crescent American Athletic club on New Beaver Field Sunday.

Attack Scores First Time

Traveling to Syracuse the Nittany passers spent an hour in scrimmage with the Onondaga Indians at the New York reservation. For the first half the team scored two goals after the Indians shot the rubber behind Harkins for the first tally. The Lion maulers commented that this was the first time that the attack really handled the ball scientifically. However before the practice game closed Onondaga gained the lead.

When the Nittany stickmen met the Orange passers, they opposed an aggression that had suffered its first defeat of the season from the Army twelve and the second consecutive trouncing from that signal Coach Cooper led ten veterans on the field with odds to score six men, points is possible.
