FRATERNITIES PLAN FOR SPRING SPORTS

Intra-Mural and Inter-Fraternity Councils Agree on Rules to Govern All Contests

BASEBALL SCHEDULE IS ANNOUNCED FOR SEASON

In preparation for one of the biggest seasons yet experienced managers of the various interfraternity sports have organized and plan to cooperate in running all events. As a result the committee has selected handsome cups which will be distributed to one of the best scores in a few days.

Under the auspices of the combined interfraternity councils the following rules have been adopted to govern all spring sports:

- 1. All freshmen who are eligible for interfraternity athletics. 2. Any varsity letterman will be ineligible for interfraternity competition in the sport in which he has made the letter. 3. Men who have made a trip of five or more miles to attend a contest shall be ineligible for that sport. 4. Any team losing one game of a series will be eliminated. 5. Rev. Bagnell To Address Chapel

Coming to Penn State, the Rev. Robert Bagnell of the Harrisburg Grace Methodist church who met with success on former visits to the Nittany valley will address the chapel service Sunday morning at eleven o'clock.

Throughout the years of his education he spent particularly all of his time under private tutors. In this way he gained much experience which helped to direct his attention to independent institutions. After he had spent a number of years teaching and founded his A. B. degree Dr. Bagnell taking graduate work at Columbia University from which he received his M. A. and Ph. D.

Dr. Bagnell held various pastorates in Iowa from 1888 to 1901. At this time he transferred to the Methodist temple in New York city, then to Brooklyn and after three years in Philadelphia he accepted his present position.

During the war he spent much time in connection with the Y. M. C. A. work in France and England where he served as a special secretary. Anticipating the prohibition that came several years later, Dr. Bagnell wrote a book on the "Economic and Moral Aspects of the Liquor Business" which appeared in 1922.
