E. L. SOWERS IS VICTIM OF HIGH POWER CURRENT

E. L. Sowers, aged 12, of 700 East College avenue met with almost instantaneous death at the College power plant early last Friday morning when he touched a high tension line carrying twenty-three thousand volts which he was preparing to tape.

The line had just been installed, making connections with the Kewanna power company system on Pennsylvania avenue. At that time the current had been turned on to test all joints and was supposed to have been shut off.

When he touched the wire, which was heavily charged he was thrown back unconscious. Although resuscitation was attempted he died shortly after the physician arrived. The deceased is survived by a wife and four children, who are provided for by an adequate life insurance.
