Penn State Overwhelms Annapolis by 87 1/2 to 47 1/2 Score—Moore Takes Both Hurdles

TORRENCE SETS COLLEGE RECORD IN QUARTER-MILE

Ensigns Have Slight Supremacy in Weight Events—Lion Entries Excel in Dashes

Piling up a sufficient lead in the dashes and distance runs to overcome the slight supremacy of the Navy weight men the Penn State track squad captured its dual meet with the Nittany on New Haven Field last Saturday by an 87 1/2 to 47 1/2 score.

The Lion team led up into the lead in the scoring column at the opening event and was never headed throughout the entire meet.

Moore Takes Hurdles

Taking the hurdles in his usual fashion, Chip Moore led throughout the entire distance in the high hurdles, crowding the final white line in the time of 17 1-5 seconds.

All three places in the 100-yard dash went to Nittany runners. Torrence leading first, Moore second and Heltzer accounting for the third place.

The mile run proved to be a feature event with Fitzpatrick and Stewart, Penn State, and Tracy and Annollys, the leading contestants.

PINCHOT SLASHES PENN STATE APPROPRIATION HALF-MILLION

Among the items to suffer curtailment by the slash of Governor Pinchot's pen on the Penn State College biennial appropriation which was set back a sum totalling more than five hundred thousand dollars in order to meet the demands of the gubernatorial economic policy.

While this is an increase of slightly more than \$130,000 over the last allotment, it is still approximately four million dollars less than that which was asked by the College authorities.

After a careful survey of conditions about the College grounds and buildings Professor Espenshade estimated the financial needs to be at least ten million dollars.
