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

Despite a remarkable mass of evidence to the contrary, Penn State men may unquestionably lay claim to some degree of sound judgment and common sense when they are given an opportunity and an incentive for cool and unhurried consideration. The opportunity is provided by the new election system and if the best men are not


SEEING EUROPE
