this event in 49 1-5 seconds. Hammond and Lyons of Navy secured the other two places in this race. Ted Mathis took first place in the broad jump, his winning leap being 22 feet 6 inches. Brilly, Lion, and Hetter of Navy took second and third. The high jump also went to Penn State when Wagner cleared the bar at 5 feet 10 inches, beating Foley of the Navy for first honors. Third place resulting in a tie between Burnett of the Academy and Stinner.

Wagner of Navy captured first place in the shot put with a heave of 42 feet 6 1/2 inches. Michalske and Okelidie securing the remaining places. Rutledge, Navy, and Durborrow, Penn State, vaulted 11 feet 6 inches for a tie in the pole vault, while Stongomors of the Blue and White secured third place. Pize of Navy acquired five points more for the Plebes in the hammer throw, Ide and Tokok securing second and third. McGarity of the Blue team was the high scorer in the discus and javelin events, with a second in the former and first honors in the latter event. Leggett of Annapolis and Michalske and Hoberly were other point-winners in these events.

As an additional feature of the day, Avin Hafflich ran a speeds 500-meters against two freshmen half-milers, each of the latter having about fifteen yards handicap. Al heasted the tape about twenty yards ahead of the two plebes, negotiating the distance in 1 minute 54 and 3-5 seconds.
