Bartholomew Wins Dash

Running one of the best races of his career, Bartholomew crossed the finish line first in the 100-yard dash with Phillips and Kilmer of the Penn State in second and third places. The winner's time in this event was 9.45 seconds only 1.5 second short of the Lion track record for this distance. Again in the 220-yard dash Bartholomew was the first man to break the tape being clocked in 21.25 seconds. Phillips and Kilmer also needed the Navy total by taking the remaining places.

In one of the closest finishes of the meet Shrop of Penn State needed only a team-mate with Cannon here of Cornell third in the 120-yard high hurdles. The half-mile also proved to be a thriller with Davis third, springing him the coveted position in the time of 2 minutes 3 seconds. Taylor, another Lion runner, was second and Holman wearing the Red of Cornell secured third.

All Places in Mile

The Navy places added many more points to their scoring column by taking all but one place in the mile and 110-yard events. Kirby and Brown were the first runners to cross the finish white line in these races. Nine more points were also garnered by the Blue and White entries in the two-mile Phillips, Culvert and Oestering leading the field in this run.

Lambert of Cornell demonstrated his ability in the shot put when he heaved the steel sphere 45 feet 10 1/2 inches. Anthony and Carlson however, prevented the Red team from earning any more counters in this event. Gates of the Penn State vaulting cleared the bar at 6 feet in the high
