According to the number now listed for the procession, the entire terrace will be occupied. Faculty members not in academic costume will be given cards of general admission and will occupy seats in the audience. The Bicentennial procession will form for faculty members at the Carnegie library and the graduates will form on the walk in front of the Botany building. The faculty Commencement procession will form in front of McAllister Hall and graduates on the walk beyond the hall. Assistant marshalls have been appointed for each school and there will be no difficulty in graduates finding their proper places.

Other plans for the Commencement Week are virtually completed. The Tuesday meeting of Dean R. L. Watts general committee was the last one.
