ishop R. L. Harris of Marquette, Michigan, has been secured to deliver the Benediction at ten-thirty o'clock Sunday morning. Penn State students first became acquainted with Doctor Harris when he addressed the 1924 National Intercollegiate Convocation in New York City. He is reputed to be a distinguished speaker and his reputation is founded upon his fine standing throughout the West. Doctor Harris has been situated in Marquette since 1917 and has also held charges in Kentucky, Ohio and Wisconsin.

Dr. Arthur Holmes, former dean of the faculty at Penn State will give the vespers address Sunday evening at six-thirty o'clock in the amphitheater on the front campus. His subject will be "Man, Mind and Money."

Class Day Exercises

Class Day exercises will begin at ten o'clock Monday morning. The men attend in caps and gowns will assemble at the front entrance of Old Main while the women, similarly garbed will form in line at the Women's building. W. G. Wood, president of the class, will give the opening address which will be followed by the Class History from the Phi Kappa and the Milton Orator. The dedicatory speech, an address by Press Thomas and the Valedictory will conclude the program.

Judge Wendell Phillips Stafford, associate justice of the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia will deliver the address to the graduating class at the services in the afternoon. Judge Stafford was formerly a justice of the Supreme Court of Vermont and has been a member of the faculty of the George Washington University since 1908.

At seven o'clock Monday night in the Auditorium there will be a concert of the combined musical clubs. The period from eight to ten will be devoted to a formal reception of the alumni, seniors, families and guests on the president's lawn. The formal Commencement at eleven in the Armory will mark the close of the ten-day celebration.

The Centre Hills course will not be long or deeply tugged as the big courses over which Hagen has played will compel him to play carefully because of its rolling fairways and numerous hazards. The fourth hole is a pitch across a brook-bottomed ravine into a "saucer" green entirely surrounded by traps. The fifth hole has been called by Alex. Hoadly father of American golf "one of the sweetest water holes in America." It is a dog-leg which crosses the brook twice and requires a perfect tee shot slightly hooked and an almost perfect approach over the water hazard that bounds the green. The seventh is entirely artificial and requires a perfect tee shot of two hundred yards into a green surrounded by deep traps. For the course is thirty-five and is not as yet been made by the many amateur and professional golfers who have played there. The course is three years old.

Gerhardt and Stevens have been practicing on the Centre Hills course for the past few days and have played several matches there this season. On the day following the match Hagen will act as starter for the automobile races on the Altoona speedway.
