NOTED ARTIST TEACHES JEWELRY TO STUDENTS

Miss Euphame Mallison Exhibited Water Colors in Galleries Throughout East

A notable addition to the summer season faculty this year is Miss Euphame C. Mallison, a well-known water color artist who is teaching the class in jewelry. The students in the class receive practical instruction in the art of making pins and jeweled rings.

The main line of Miss Mallison's work is water coloring, with jewelry as a side line. A recent achievement of Miss Mallison is the cover for the August number of *Stitcher's Magazine*, which will be on sale near the end of this month. The cover contains a picture of a beach scene from 1870-1880, showing bathers as they appeared three-quarters of a century ago.

Miss Mallison is a member of the Southern State Art League and the Baltimore Water Color Club. She has exhibited at the American Water Color society, the New York Water Color club, the Art Institute of Chicago, and the Baltimore Water Color club.

She exhibited a series of engravings of New England social life entitled "The New England Social Life" at the annual combined exhibition of the American Water Color Society and the New York Water Color club in New York city. "Where Kiv Lived" and "The Old Cabin" were shown at the Art Institute of Chicago and the Baltimore Water Color club. A water color entitled "Two Sisters" was exhibited at the American Water Color Society and also appeared in *Vogue*.

At present Miss Mallison has several paintings on exhibition at the Robertson-Dechamps Gallery in New York. She has been written up in several French magazines of art and also in the *Broadway Life*.

POTATO GROWERS SPRAY 40,000 ACRES IN STATE

Almost 40,000 acres of potatoes are being sprayed in the Keystone State this season, six extension specialists at Penn State put of this is being covered by forty-two spray rings, where several growers go together and provide a machine and an operator to keep spraying their potato vines throughout the summer. Seven of these operators are students from the agricultural school at Penn State. In the spray rings an effort is made to get an application of spray on each field once every ten days. The forty-two rings are in operation in eighteen counties, including one in Philadelphia county where a student operator enters for service areas.

PLAYERS SCORE HIT IN FINAL PRODUCTION OF COMEDY "KEMPS"

PENN STATE EXTENSION COURSE MEETS SUCCESS

Enrollment Climbs to More Than 5000—Extra-mural Subjects Exceed 100 Mark

An increase in enrollment of over 25 per cent in the various extra-mural courses conducted by the department of teacher training extension of Penn State for the year just closed is reported by Dr. A. S. Hurrell, director. More than five thousand students have availed themselves of the opportunity to do class work in their home communities without the necessity of relinquishing their teaching positions.

During the year the department conducted 115 extra-mural courses in forty different communities, two of which are held outside of the state. Pittsburgh proved to be the largest teaching center of the department with a total enrollment of 1623. More than eighty different courses were made available to Allegheny county teachers at the Pittsburgh center.

According to Dr. Hurrell the past year showed an increased demand for advanced courses, covering graduate credit, and fifteen courses of this type have been offered. The constantly increasing number of teachers availing themselves of the Penn State extension courses indicates that this type of educational service is but another valuable contribution of the college to the service to the commonwealth.

In addition to the extra-mural courses offered, the correspondence study offerings of the department were greatly in demand during the year. Almost eight hundred teachers joined the "study-at-home" method of professional improvement through the college department. The teacher training extension department is a branch of the school of Education of the college.
