What is said to be one of the most valuable collections of North American minerals and ores in existence has been presented to the School of Mines and Metallurgy at the Pennsylvania State College.

The collection contains scores of valuable and interesting minerals in excellent condition and enclosed in cases and suitably labeled. The exhibit is the result of many years work on the part of Mr. MacMillan, a well known geologist and was maintained as a private collection at his late home at Dulrose, Pennsylvania.
