

RUSHING PETITION GRANTED I. F. C.

Fraternity Presidents Notified By Letter—Intramural Council Takes Similar Action

PAY TELEPHONE QUESTION HELD FOR CONSIDERATION

Chief among the business transactions of the Interfraternity Council at its first meeting of the year was the appointment of a committee to petition the executive committee of the National Fraternity Council to begin rushing at 11:00 a. m. on Saturday morning and that they be permitted to begin rushing yesterday morning at eight o'clock, which petition was granted by the executive committee.

A letter was sent to each of the fraternity presidents explaining the action taken. One paragraph of this letter reads: "Any imposition of a rushing code must be imposed on all fraternities and the official rushing of fraternities will be prohibited according to the constitution of the Interfraternity Council."

"If your fraternity," concludes the letter, "should encounter any problem which may place it in a precarious position it is not sure that the problem be placed in the hands of the officers of this body. By so doing you may save your fraternity the embarrassment of being subjected to the penalties imposed for rushing in the constitution of the Interfraternity Council."

Freshman Week Explained

Appearing before the Council representative of the executive committee of Freshman Week, D. D. Henry '26 explained in detail the object of requiring the first year men to come to College a week earlier than the remaining student body. W. Bower '26 was appointed chairman of a committee to handle Interfraternity grades and to take care of the scholastic standing.

While there was no general discussion on the question of installing pay telephones in the fraternity houses, action was postponed until the state classification of fraternities could be ascertained. Similar action was taken by the Intramural Council in respect to rushing a: that adopted by the Interfraternity Council.

DR. HONEYWELL IS PLACED IN CHARGE OF AG. LABORATORY

Dr. E. E. Honeywell, formerly of Columbia University and the Carnegie Research Station, the Experimental Evolution, has been appointed assistant professor of agronomy and biological chemistry in charge of the experimental animal laboratory.

Miss Emma Frances who took the March 1925 election of the Council has been appointed instructor in bookkeeping to take the place of Prof. A. J. Parke, who will be on leave of absence for a year to pursue graduate work at Cornell.

Paul Vanite will become graduate assistant in soil technology and will receive his degree in time to graduate work in the department of agronomy.

The reception will start at 7:30 o'clock. Final plans will be announced in Friday's issue of the paper.

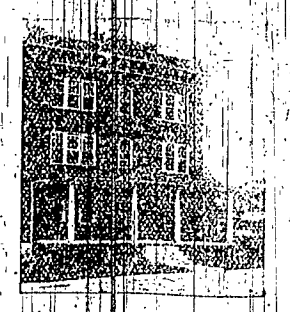
VARSITY GRIDMEN HOLD TWO WORKOUTS DAILY
