

CHEMISTRY AND PHYSICS SCHOOL ENLARGES STAFF

Six New Instructors Attached to Department—Three Are Penn State Grads

Dean G. L. Wendt, head of the School of Chemistry and Physics, has secured six new instructors to assist with this year's work. Three of the new men will teach chemistry, while the other three will come under the department of physics.

Prof. J. E. Snyder, who secured his Bachelor of Science and Master of Science degrees at the Iowa State college at Ames, will act as graduate assistant in chemistry. Professor Snyder who is working for his Doctor of Philosophy degree will also do research work in catalysis along with Dean Wendt.

Mr. A. Bastress, who received his Bachelor of Science degree at Penn State in 1923 and who has been instructor at the American university at Beirut, Syria, for the past two years, will also be a graduate assistant in chemistry. He is also studying for a Master of Science degree. Mr. O. L. Roberts, who has received his Bachelor of Science degree from Baker university of Kansas and who is working for his Master of Science degree here, will be the third graduate assistant in chemistry.

Mr. J. S. Carey, who secured the degree of chemical engineer from Lehigh university in 1922 and who has spent the last three years as instructor in the department of electro-chemical engineering at Penn State, is now an instructor in physics. Mr. H. L. Yeagley, who received his Bachelor of Science degree from The Pennsylvania State College in 1921 and who was an assistant in chemistry last year, will be an instructor in physics this year. A. R. Rothrock '25 is a graduate assistant in physics. He is working for his Master of Science degree.
