Pritchard was injured in a practice scrimmage and has been resting, his side of the backfield being taken over by Helbig. Pritchard, however, will be seen at fullback tomorrow.
 Freshmen Give Varsity Struggle
 Even though the Varsity won a 12-6 victory over the freshmen in the practice game Wednesday afternoon, it was only by virtue of a driving rally late in the encounter that the victor was gained. Wolf started the offensive for the yearlings with a thirty-yard run off left tackle after his team had taken the pigskin from the Penn State representatives on

down at the 40-yard mark. Two more plays found the ball resting behind the Varsity's goal line, placed there by Whitmore. Wilson failed to kick the goal.
 The game saw-sawed back and forth until Clark Wilson picked up a yearling fumble and raced across the line for the Varsity's first score. No goal was attempted.
 Roepke, substituted for Greene to ward the closing minutes of the game, ran wild, scoring three first downs and going over for the six-pointer which decided the game. Last year Roepke was a pluggger with the freshman team and in those games in which he saw service, was responsible for gaining much yardage. It is altogether possible that he may be injected into the contest with F and M tomorrow, since he is capable of reeling off many yards when once fully started.

DARTMOUTH ENFORCES NEW PLEDGING SYSTEM

Dartmouth college has put into effect this year a ruling which prohibits any fraternity from pledging a freshman. Every yearling will be required to sign a pledge saying that he will not pledge or obligate himself in any way to any fraternity until he comes back as a sophomore.
 The preferential system of bidding will be used. Each sophomore will submit to the interfraternity council his choice of fraternities in preferential order. At the same time each fraternity will submit its choice of men in preferential order. When the interfraternity council has checked the two lists it will notify the fraternity of the men who have accepted its bid.
