SCHOOL OF EDUCATION MAKES IMPROVEMENTS

Additions To Extension Work Made in Several Large Cities of State

Planning to make its courses more popular this year than ever before, the School of Education has made numerous improvements in its Extension work.

A new office has been established in the State Chamber of Commerce Building in Harrisburg, in which Miss Mabel Kirk, a recent addition to the faculty, will assist Prof. P. A. Metz, the eastern representative of the work.

Not confining the improvements to one section of the state alone, the office of the Pittsburgh Teaching Center has been moved from the Central Y. M. C. A. Building to the Iron City college building. Mrs. Ella Longmire, formerly of the School of Education in the University of Pittsburgh, has been added to the staff to assist in the work in that city. The present enrollment in the Pittsburgh Teaching Center is larger than ever before in the history of the school.

At the Johnstown division of the work eleven classes have already been organized and are in operation while plans are being made for the organization of three additional classes. Professor Green and his assistants are conducting extension classes in Natural Science with large enrollments.

So far this year, there has been a great demand for extension courses of graduate character. The department is at present conducting graduate courses at Pittsburgh, Harrisburg, Altoona and Merittstown. Plans are now under way to have Dr. D. A. Anderson conduct an extension course for the faculty of the Bloomsburg State Normal school.

The total enrollment of students in the extension courses conducted last year was fifty-two hundred and present indications show that this high mark will be exceeded during the current season.

at the time of the sawmill instruction. These parts are the property of several manufacturers who have requested that they be used in carrying on a research project in power and labor requirements for Pennsylvania agriculturists. Numbering among the new equipment are a general purpose tractor, a power-driven corn picker, tractor plow, tractor grain drill and a tractor mowing machine. After being shown at the sawmill school they will be kept and used in various experiments.
