

CHANGES IN CASTS MADE BY PLAYERS

Rehearsals Bring Alterations in Two Feature Productions for Coming Season

"THE FIRST YEAR" TO BE PRESENTED NEXT MONTH

Several important changes in the personnel of the casts of both "Charley's Aunt" and "The First Year," the Penn State Players two feature productions, have marked the rehearsals to date.

R. K. Elden '29 has been transferred from his place in "Charley's Aunt" to play the character Mr. Balfour in "The First Year." His former position will be filled by H. F. Schwartz '29.

Of the new pairs that comprise the cast of the Oxford farce, seven are being portrayed by newcomers. Four of the seven making their initial debut for the Players are members of the freshmen class. They are: Marion McVicker, Schwartz, W. H. Roberts and W. W. Kelly. R. W. Huston '27, who played Robin in the performance "Not So Fast" during the past summer session, will make his second appearance on the Nittany campus when he enacts the important character Babbs.

The remaining members of the cast of "Charley's Aunt," which will receive its first tryout on November twentieth, are Josephine Canner '26, Frances Hayward '28 and J. G. Haag '26. Miss Canner took part in both "The Whole Town's Talking" and "Wedding Bells." Miss Hayward appeared in "The Whole Town's Talking," while Haag was among those behind the footlights in the commencement play, "Seven Keys to Baldpate."

The First Year While the cast of "Charley's Aunt" is so well "spinkled" with newcomers the personnel of "The First Year" represents a "shower" of veteran talent. Performers of the latter play have not tread the stage before under the auspices of the Players.

As a safeguard against any emergency that might result through illness or other causes, every performer will master two parts instead of the plan of former years by which two actors learned one role. In addition to this precaution, two understudies will be trained in all the male and female characters of every play.

"The First Year," the main road show of the year, is scheduled for the first appearance in Harrisburg on November thirteenth while "Charley's Aunt" will receive a trial engagement in some nearby city one week before its opening in State College. An entertainment staged by the alumni of the Players on Alumni Day will feature the annual reunion at the University Club.

COLLEGE SENATE ADOPTS UNIFORM ACTIVITY RULES

(Continued from first page) "Uniform Scholastic Eligibility Rules for all Undergraduate Students Enrolled in Extra-Curricular College Activities, including members of varsity and freshmen athletic teams, students taking part in public performances of college dramatic, musical or similar organizations, and students participating in student publications and similar organizations of all these activities."

(a) Eligibility for membership in athletic teams shall be determined by the Senate Athletic Committee. (b) Eligibility for participation in student publications activities shall be determined by the Senate Publications Committee. (c) Eligibility for managers and assistants of athletic teams and other men's organizations in extra-curricular activities not covered in a, b, c and d shall be determined by the office of the Dean of Men. (e) Eligibility for all women's extra-curricular activities not covered in a, b, c and d shall be determined by the office of the Dean of Women.

At the end of the first eight weeks of each semester and before the beginning of each new semester the appropriate committee or office shall obtain a "scholastic report" showing the standing and attendance record of each candidate for membership in these extra-curricular organizations of the school in which the candidate is enrolled.

No student shall take part in these extra-curricular activities during the first eight weeks of a semester who was considered or failed to show 50 per cent or more in the first eight weeks of the semester in attendance and who has not received the conditions or failures in excess of this number.

At the end of the eight weeks period in each semester the appropriate committee or office shall obtain grades of all students taking part in these extra-curricular activities. Any student who has received a low grade (below 60 per cent, or 4, or 2) for the eight weeks period in excess of the number provided, than student declared scholastically ineligible because of low grades at the end of the eight weeks period. If at that time he or she shall have not more than six credit hours below grade (below 60 or 4, or 2) as reported through the Dean of his or her school within 48 hours before the departure of any team or entertainment organization for a trip which involves absence from classes, a list of those respecting to make the trip as a part of the team.

or organization shall be submitted to the appropriate committee or office for approval. To each student permitted to make the trip the committee or office shall furnish a statement authorizing the absence from class. The statement must be submitted by the student to each instructor from whose classes he or she is absent for the trip.

The number of class hours of permissible absence from the college on the part of individuals composing one or more of the various teams and organizations shall not exceed 40 hours in any semester. In this computation Saturday is reckoned as four hours and the other week days as eight hours, four in the morning and three in the afternoon. Teams or entertainment organizations leaving the campus for public exhibition and advertised as representing the college shall, while absent, be accompanied by and shall be under the direction of a member of the faculty or other person approved by the appropriate committee or office. They shall travel and return together and be accompanied by the person in charge, who shall not be at liberty to grant any excuse involving absence from class.

Special interpretation of these rules as applied to individual cases shall be made by the appropriate committee or office after consultation with the Dean of the school in which the student is enrolled. These rules replace Rules No. 29 and 35 but not 34, and Rule 36 but not Rule 37 in the Regulations Affecting Students.

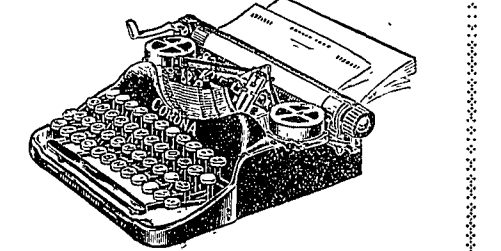
