outline the four proposals placed before the country relative to the Court.

In brief the Swarson Willis resolutions are first, that the United States delegates sit with the Council and assemble in the election of judges; second, that the United States pay its share of the expenses of the Court; third, that the United States adhere to the Court until no legal obligations under the League except the first two named, and lastly, that the statutes of the Court be not amended without the consent of the United States.

Nation-Wide Representation  
 Delegates of Princeton, Yale, Harvard, Dartmouth, Vassar, Barnard, Bryn Mawr met at New York City last week and planned a powerful intercollegiate conference at Princeton for Friday and Saturday, December eleventh and twelfth. Led by a strong faculty authority similar meetings will be held throughout the country to bring reports of student opinions in their respective sections, and possibly to send resolutions to President Coolidge.
