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GLEEMEN LAUDED IN HOME CONCERT

Pianoforte and Violin Solos Win Applause—Varsity Quartet Encored Repeatedly

LARGE AUDIENCE GREET'S FIRST APPEARANCE HERE

From the opening "Border Ballad" by Maundert to Henry's "Invictus" by Protehio, the Penn State Glee Club exhibited the fineness of careful preparation under the tutelage of Director R. W. Grant of the music department at its opening concert in the Auditorium Friday night.

Four pianoforte solos by Miss Lucille Skinner, assistant professor in music, evoked long and continued plaudits from the delighted audience. R. R. Shanley '27 after executing a "Romance from Concerto" gave a violin encore, while the Varsity Quartet returned again and again under the persuasive applause of the assemblage.

Pianoforte
"Border Ballad," "Two Roses" composed by Werner and "Mah Lindy Lou" by Strickland marked the opening of the recital. The songsters then gave way to Miss Skinner who chanted the concert-goers by interpreting an Etude by Liszt and one of Chopin's waltzes. An encore was demanded but none was forthcoming.

After the Varsity Quartet came Shanley's violin solo who, after an encore, yielded to the Glee Club. The vocal artists then entertained with selections from Gaul, Parker and Jingle. In the last mentioned, three members of the Varsity Quartet came to the front of the stage in leaders in the song, "Knocked 'Em in the Old Kent Road."

Student Song
"Lamp in the West" by Parker has been chosen by the authorities of the Intercollegiate as the song for this year. Since this is conducted by students only, Director Grant is training R. W. Graham '26, first tenor on the Varsity Quartet, in the art of leading the organization. In this selection, Graham took charge.

Two more pianoforte solos and the first and second Varsity Quartets provided diversion until the four songsters topped off their part of the program by giving an interpretation of "Collegiate" in alternation with the second choice men. The program closed with the singing of "Anne Laurie" arranged by Dudley Buck.

In the last number, Miss Skinner played the piano while Mrs. I. O. Grant executed the piece on the pipe organ. Mrs. Grant was accompanist for the songsters in every piece except the student number, in which Hummel Fishburn took her place, and the last selection.

Team Weakened by Failure of Captain Liggett To Return To College

Faced with the contingency of entering the coming winter season without the services of Captain-elect W. C. Liggett '26 and confronted by the necessity of developing a winning team from a squad of inexperienced material, Coach Leonard is diligently searching among a large number of candidates for men of true wrestling ability.

Captain Liggett's presence on the team this year would greatly enhance Penn State's chance for a successful season. However, Coach Leonard has as yet received no word from him stating that he would be back. In the light of the fact that the freshman thirty-five pounder from last year has not returned it is doubly important that Captain Liggett return.

Practice Daily
Daily workouts are being held and although the practice sessions are not long the men are put through stiff training. The coach is still drilling the squad in the fundamentals of the sport and will continue the same for some time to come.

Three-minute scrimmage bouts are now a regular part of the schedule. In these contests the men have been showing a great deal of spirit and fight, but as yet have not come to the point where they can use the holds to the best advantage.

Stresses Thought
Coach Leonard is continually stressing the value of thinking at all times during the bout. This ability to think and think quickly is one of the essential factors in becoming a good wrestler, according to the coach.

At this time it is hard to tell to what extent the candidates have responded to the coaching, on account of the inexperience of the squad as a whole. The men have from the first shown a willingness to work and to learn.
