Penn State To Have Three New Buildings

plan will follow as pledge payments are made.

More than \$1,000,000 was pledged for emergency buildings by 19,407 students, alumni and friends of the college, in the campaign conducted in 1923. Varsity Hall dormitory was the first of the buildings to be erected. Other buildings contemplated are a Student Union building, dormitories and an activities building for women students. Part of the money for these has been pledged and paid.

The three new structures, according to present plans, are to be ready for use of students on or before September 1, 1927.

Student interest is centered largely in the new recreation building, for the present facilities are far from adequate. The Army room built for a student body of less than 200 thirty-five years ago, seats less than half of the 3700 students.

The new building eventually will have five units, a large playing floor with amphitheatre seats, swimming pool, locker rooms, individual sports facilities, offices and rooms for varsity and visiting teams in all sports. The main auditorium of playing floor and amphitheatre is the only unit for which funds are now available.

This hall will be located adjacent to Varsity Hall, less than 200 yards from all varsity athletic fields, and within 300 yards of the intramural recreation fields and the golf course. It will be a center for student recreational activities. A major portion of the funds for this building were provided by the College Athletic Association and by men prominent in the manufacturing and coal industries of the state.

Hundreds of potato growers of Pennsylvania have made the hospital a possibility, in one of the most unique endeavors ever undertaken for a state institution of higher learning. Prominent growers, learning of the College's desire for student welfare buildings, volunteered to provide the hospital in return for the greatest assistance given them by the College, they said, namely, through the efforts of Prof. E. J. Nixon, extension plant pathologist, whom they know as "Pennsylvania's Potato Wizard," and

organizer of the famous "100 Bushel Potato Clubs."

This building will in no way attempt to rival a city of university hospital, nor will it be of the type for practice and instruction of medical students. From the first it has been designed as an infirmary and dispensary for the prevention and treatment of diseases among students, and will replace the small frame building with limited space that has been used by the College health service for the past twelve years.

The proposed dormitory to match and stand opposite Frederick Watts Hall on the west campus, will represent the combined efforts of leading agricultural interests in its provision, exclusive of the potato growers, and the State Grange which is engaged in raising funds for a women's dormitory. The building will house more than 100 students and start a third side of the proposed men's dormitory quadrangle, of which Varsity Hall is the head-house.

teams, the Varsity appeared powerful and should put up a stiff battle against the Iron city team. Coach Hermann will start the same line-up that he has been using in past contests providing Harris is able to get into uniform. Page, Barron, Kent and Saylor will go along with the team as substitutes.

Although Pitt met with reverses at the opening of the season, the team is one of the most powerful ever developed there and in the past few weeks has swept their opponents before them. The Panthers are credited with victories over Cornell, West Virginia, W and J, and other strong combinations.

It was early this week that the Blue and Gold revealed its fighting power when it defeated the Little Presidents in one of the greatest games ever played between the two schools. Coach Carlson's men emerged on the long end of a 31 to 28 score in a see-saw thriller.

Sykes Reed, who played with the 1927 freshman class team is the most outstanding Pitt passer and has carried off honors in every game. He was the leading scorer in the last game, being credited with five field goals. Las-felt will share the guard posts with the former Penn State player with Captain Parsons and Wioleska at the advance positions. Horse Chase, captain of last fall's football team will start in the center. A record crowd is expected at the game Saturday night when the Blue and White meets the Dukes for the first time in a number of years. The full-toppers defeated the Navy footmen at Annapolis last Saturday and have established a reputation which they are anxious to hold.

Training for the week-end engagement began Tuesday when they returned from their successful eastern trip. Coach Davies has been putting his passers through strenuous drill in the hope of taming the Lion and he is looking forward to a close battle. The Varsity and freshman teams will arrive in Pittsburgh at about five o'clock this afternoon and will stay at the Pittsburgh Athletic Association clubhouse during the trip.
