Six Weeks Instruction Course Will Be Maintained By Collegian

PERIOD OF ENLISTMENT IS EXTENDED ONE WEEK

### THREE-MATCHES LISTED FOR CO-ED RIFLE TEAM

Girls Fire Against Universities of Nevada, Cincinnati and Cornell This Week

Ten co-eds, forming the women's rifle team, are representing Penn State in collegiate athletics in the only sport in which Penn State women may compete with other colleges. The firing squad has been scheduled for a series of eight telegraphic matches to be conducted at the rate of one a week throughout the season.

In April, the final month of the season, the team will cope with other college squads in a National Educational match under the auspices of the Dot and Circle sorority. This society, established at Northwestern Reserve university aims to organize a National League of Women Shooters. Hence, to interest college women, it offers a silver cup to the winning team in the national contest. Contrary to custom, fifteen women will take part in

this match, the ten highest scores being recognized.

### Start of Co-ed Athletics

Penn State women should be vitally interested in this team since it represents an achievement in a field so new to girls and because the future of women's athletics at Penn State depends, in a measure, on its success.

Lieutenant Miller, the coach, declares that the co-eds have made great progress and now can make scores of which no team need be ashamed. This is especially creditable as all but three of the shooters were inexperienced when the present college year began. These three, Misses E. A. Bullock '27, L. E. Anderson '27 and Katherine Holbrook '28 used the rifle last year under the direction of Lieutenant Miller.

Because of a mistake in scheduling, three matches were fired this week against the University of Nevada, the University of Cincinnati and Cornell university. A good Nittany showing is expected; as perfect scores were hung up last week, by Miss Bullock and Miss Dunlap.

Those firing in the three matches this week are the Misses E. A. Bullock '27, M. P. Callahan '27, H. M. Hakes '27, J. E. Womer '27, L. E. Anderson '27, Katherine Holbrook '28, W. M. Forbes '28, J. G. Ritter '29, M. L. Dunlap '29 and E. T. Deubler '29.

### Chapel Attendance Is Graduation Requisite

That all senior students who failed to attend daily and Sunday chapel during the last or preceding semesters shall be required to attend during the second term or be ineligible for graduation was the ruling passed by the Administration Committee on Chapel Delinquents on Tuesday, Judge H. Walton Mitchell presiding over the body.

This action affects sixty-eight seniors who have failed for but one semester and twenty-seven men who have incurred two or more semesters of chapel delinquency. Students of the

first class shall attend Sunday and twice during the week until graduation.

Candidates for June graduation having failures in two or more semesters at the present time shall attend on Sunday and the four sessions during the week. No unexcused absences shall be permitted. If there is any failure in complying with these regulations the violator will not be permitted to graduate in June or later, the act stated.

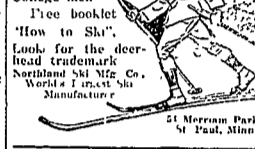
next higher group. Hooba and Harrell are the only remaining contestants in the sixty-pound weight with Hallett having a strong hold on the honor.
