Running almost such men as Loren Muchison, Carl Christensen and Ray Wolf, Capt. in Chip Moore, Dick Bartholomew and Bill Cox will compete in the Wilco indoor games at Brooklyn tomorrow evening. While the three Nittany stars are in New York, the team under the track squad will hold its third handicap competition on the Armory board track immediately after the University of Virginia home game match.

When Chip Moore receives stride for stride with Ray Wolf of Pennsylvania in the 110-yard and low hurdles two of the best intercollegiate lumber-toppers will be in action. The race promises to be the high light of the meet.

Bartholomew and Cox, Bartholomew's first appearance as a Varsity runner will find him lined up against some of the outstanding sprinters in the East. Loren Muchison, running against him, will furnish a critical test for the Penn State sprinter who will be handicapped by the rule against spiked shoes.
