

Examination Schedule

All recitations and practicals for the second semester will end Saturday June 5, 1926, at noon. There will be no scheduled examinations for seniors or those graduating in June. Examinations for juniors, sophomores and freshmen will take place from June 7 to June 11 inclusive.

Any student having two examinations scheduled at the same time, or any student having three examinations scheduled on the same day, is required to report the fact in person at the Registrar's office on the special form provided there. To receive adjustment such conflicts MUST be reported not later than five o'clock on Wednesday, March 31. No conflicts occur after March 31.

Notices of adjustment will be mailed to students and to heads of departments on May 3. Appointment examinations should not be arranged until after notices of adjustments have been sent out. The dates of these examinations will be announced during the week of May 17 by the instructors concerned. Examinations will be of two hours duration, beginning at eight and ten-twenty A. M. and two P. M.

Plans for Up-to-date Hospital Under Way

Preliminary to laying out plans for the new hospital to be provided largely by Pennsylvania potato growers for Penn State, Dr. J. P. Ritenour, College physician, is making inspection trips to other colleges and to Pennsylvania cities collecting data for use in the interior design of the proposed building. It is planned to make the student infirmary as up-to-date as possible so as to render the greatest service in preventing and treating sickness among students.

Plans for the playing floor and amphitheater of the proposed recreation hall at Penn State are already under way and hopes are entertained for an early start on the construction of both buildings. They will be erected with money from the emergency building fund raised by the College in 1925.
