Preliminary bouts. The first round will be held this afternoon and the semi-finals will be staged tonight at eight o'clock. At two-thirty tomorrow afternoon the final round to determine championships will be held. Following these matches, those contestants eliminated during the first rounds will compete for second and third places.

A fall in any round, preliminary, semi-final, or final, will count one point. Winners in the final contest receive four points, second place two, and third place one. The highest total score will determine the Eastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Association champion.
