Penn State hopes for the mile relay title rest on the team that last year captured the freshman championship, Bartholomew, Sands, Kuthach and Filkins. The veteran Torrance may replace one of these four men. Penn State's quarter-mile team will be recruited from practically the same candidates and Brierly, Kilmer and Mathias. A two-mile team will be formed from C. E. Smith, O. Smith, Taylor, Davis, Kittle and Helfrich. While most of their opponents have seen hard competition the Lion runners will face their first test in the Red and Blue games. This experience manifests itself in the difficulty the men have in passing the baton.

Four veterans, Barclay, Stewart, Fouracre and Reier, Johnson or Brown, will carry Penn State's colors against a championship field in the four-mile relay. In Saturday's trials Fouracre nosed out Reis in the mile, while Stewart, Johnson and Brown followed close in that order.

The times of the trials Saturday were slow, but this may be attributed to the brisk wind that swept the ends and frequently overcast the high hurdles. Nate had his freshman quarter-milers out for their final trials but was not enthused by the showing of his men. Cox came in first in a spirited race, followed closely by Offenhauser, Bowie, Wilde, Lockwood and Faulkner.

Special Events

Coach Cartmell is doubtful about entering any men in the special events Saturday. If he does, Brierly, Bartholomew, Filkins and Torrence will compete in the 100-yard dash. Bates and Sullivan in the high jump, Mathias in the broad, Ammeiman and Roberts in the javelin throw, Ide

and Reed in the hammer and Michael-ske in the discus throw are other possible entries. Ide and Bartholomew seem to have the best chances of placing in their events.
