### FRATERNITY TRACK MEET SET FOR FIRST OF MAY

Individuals Limited to Three Events—Five Places To Count in Scoring

Inter-fraternity and inter-unit track meets will be held on New Beaver field on Saturday afternoon, May first, according to Manager H. R. Gilbert. The following Monday, May third, the same groups will compete separately in one mile relay races.

Starting promptly at one o'clock, the regular fifteen events will be run off in the customary order Saturday afternoon. The rules allow one man to participate in no more than three events. In scoring, the first five places will count as follows: first, second, fourth, third, three, fourth, two, fifth, one.

To the fraternity and to the unit gaining the highest number of points a silver loving cup will be awarded. A cup will likewise be presented to the winning relay teams of each group.

All fraternities and districts are urged to have their entries on the field and ready to participate by one o'clock on Saturday afternoon.

### ROWE, MATHEMATICIAN, INVENTS USEFUL DEVICE

Professor Joseph E. Rowe, formerly in the mathematics department at Penn State, has recently invented an instrument for solving problems of trigonometry, much as an angle is laid off with a protractor. The instrument will solve all kinds of trigonometric problems without the application of any mathematics other than laying off angles on circles and distances on scales. Professor Rowe is now director of the Extension department of William and Mary college in Virginia. After leaving Penn State he was Professor at the Aberdeen Proving Grounds of the United States Navy, at Aberdeen, Maryland.

Should Barclay run his usual race the Blue and White squad made up of the veterans Fournace, Stewart, Rees and Barclay, will be a serious contender. The Nittany distance men, the hurdlers, the quarter-mile team, and the mile quartet, pending Sands' eligibility, seem to be Penn State's strongest combinations.

McClellan, who has shown steady improvement, is sure to throw the hammer at that event. The powerful weight man will encounter keen opposition from several outstanding eastern performers but should place among the leaders. Several others have been entered in the special events but may not be called into action.
