

Board Revises Constitution Of Penn State Collegian

Following the election of a new COLLEGIAN staff recently the Board of Penn State's official newspaper revised its constitution which became effective March sixteenth.

An important change in the code of rules is the installation of a fourth man on the junior business staff. This move was undertaken with the idea of keeping pace with the rapid expansion of the newspaper and especially to give more efficient service to advertisers.

The complete revised constitution is as follows:

DECORATION DAY PROGRAM

Arrangements for the decoration day program are now being considered by the committee. The national guards, R O T C unit and numerous civic organizations will parade Monday, May thirty-first. There will be outside speakers for chapel service Sunday and for the evening May thirty-first. Field day will be held Friday afternoon, May twenty-eighth.

ARTICLE I
SECTION I NAME—The name of this organization shall be the Penn State COLLEGIAN Publishing Board.

SECTION 2 PURPOSES—The purpose of this organization shall be the publication of a newspaper, the name of which shall be the Penn State COLLEGIAN.

SECTION 3 PUBLICATION—The time of publication and the number of issues in each college year shall be decided by the governing board.

SECTION 4 GOVERNING POWER—The governing power of this organization shall be vested in a board as hereafter provided for.

SECTION 5 EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE—As hereafter provided for shall have power to act officially on all matters in and out of the Penn State COLLEGIAN at all times when the board is not in session and shall be directly responsible to students and faculty for the administration of the paper.

SECTION 6 COMPOSITION—(1) The BOARD shall be composed of students regularly enrolled in any college of the department of the Pennsylvania State College, who have been elected according to the methods hereafter provided for.

(2) The EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE shall consist of the Editor-in-Chief, Business Manager and one member elected by the board.

SECTION 7 ORGANIZATION—(1) The BOARD shall have two sub-committees, namely (A) Editorial department, (B) Business department.

(2) The Editorial department of the board shall consist of Editor-in-Chief, an Assistant Editor, a Business Editor, and three Associate Editors, all of whom shall be seniors, and six News Editors, all of whom shall be juniors.

SECTION 8 FRANCHISE—The existing board shall have the right to vote on matters pertaining to the paper.

SECTION 9 QUORUM—A quorum shall consist of three-fourths of the members of the board.

SECTION 10 CANDIDATES—The Editor-in-Chief or the Business Manager may at his discretion issue a call for candidates to try out for positions in the department of the staff with which he is associated.

SECTION 11 BALLOTING—All votes shall be secret. Absent members may vote by proxy, with the proviso that a vote for a candidate who has become ineligible is null and void.

SECTION 12 MEETINGS—The President shall call meetings of the board at least once a month, or more frequently as he shall deem wise.

SECTION 13 OFFICERS—The OFFICERS of the BOARD shall be as follows: President, Editor-in-Chief, Vice-President,

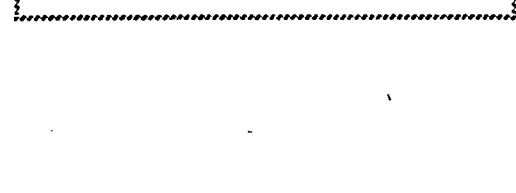
