

MUSICAL GROUPS TO GIVE CONCERT

Glee, Orchestra And Mandolin Clubs Hold Joint Recital June Fourteenth

WILL BE TWENTY-SIXTH ANNUAL PRESENTATION

Prominent in the events of Commencement Week will be the appearance of the combined musical clubs, including the Glee Club, Orchestra and Mandolin Club in the Auditorium Monday evening, June fourteenth, at eight o'clock. It will mark the twenty-sixth presentation of these organizations on a Commencement program.

The annual Baccalaureate Sunday evening concert will be held in the Auditorium at eight o'clock on June thirteenth with the Music department offering a program of vocal and instrumental selections by advanced students and faculty members of the department.

For the fifth time this year the Glee Club will appear on the Auditorium stage. Among the selections listed as part of the recital will be several novelty numbers. According to Director R. W. Grant the work of the vocalists this year has been the most successful in the organization's history.

Bandmaster W. O. Thompson's Orchestra and S. H. Torchin's 27 Mandolin Club will furnish the instrumental part of the program. An advance ticket sale for this concert will be held at the Athletic store Tuesday evening, June eighth.

(Continued from first page) Torchin '27, vice-president E. L. Spiller '27 was elected by the Council to serve as secretary.

Recommendations submitted to the Council for action by Thomas Cain Jr., chairman of the elections committee, were read and passed. The accepted resolutions provide for greater election publicity to non-fraternity freshmen in order to secure a greater poll from the class.

Soliciting of votes, electioneering, button-holing and similar tactics within the immediate vicinity of voting booths will be strictly prohibited. Voters will be reported to the Council and their names will be published.

The recommendations provided that no votes for any offices be solicited by means of printed matter of any nature whatsoever. It was advised that some means be taken to insure the election of men qualified to hold office. One suggestion was that candidates present a petition signed by twenty bonafide voters to the elections committee. To eliminate promiscuous nominating it was suggested that a booklet containing the photographs and qualifications of candidates be published by the elections committee. This plan is now being used at the University of Illinois.

D. D. Henry '26, returning president of the Council, read the new Penn State administrative code devised by Denn C. W. Stodiar of the College Senate, and a committee of the Council composed of D. D. Henry '26, P. M. Scheffer '26 and C. H. Moore '26.

The code, designed to regulate student government and extra-curricular activities, met with the approval of the Council.

A motion that the president of the sophomore class should automatically be made a member of Student Tribunal, was acted upon favorably. D. D. Henry, returning president, thanked the retiring members of the Council and urged the support of the incoming officers.

C. H. Moore '26, speaking on behalf of the Tribunal, recommended that three-year pre-legal and pre-medical students be granted junior customs their second year and senior customs their third. After some discussion the matter was tabled for further consideration.

Blue Key nominations as submitted by H. A. Cannon '27, were ratified. Thomas Cain Jr., returning secretary, reported on the student relief fund, giving the bank balance and a review of what was accomplished during the year.
