 will be used during the summer and it is proposed to provide a new studio in Old Main and eventually remote control stations in the Auditorium and armory.
 Approval of the recommendation by the Senate student welfare committee that the five girls' campus clubs be allowed to petition for charters in women's national fraternities, or sororities, was given by the Trustees. These clubs have been on trial for several years, and members have conclusively demonstrated that the clubs are worth-while additions to the student life on the campus.
 The many local friends of John H. Fizzell, formerly of the English department faculty, will be pleased to learn of his appointment as associate professor of public speaking, and that he will return to teaching duties in September after an absence of several years.
 The resignation of Professor A. L. Koehler, head of the department of architecture, was accepted by the Trustees.
 Full professorships were granted in promotions for C. W. Beese, C. W. Hasck, Ray O'Donnell and W. F. Dunaway. Dr. C. R. Orton has had his leave of absence extended for another year.


W. P. Davey, professor of physical chemistry and Emil D. Ries, associate professor of chemical engineering, newly appointed members of the faculty of the School of Chemistry and Physics, received additional titles, the former as professor and the latter as associate professor of industrial research. Eugene Lorand is also to become assistant professor of industrial research, being transferred from the post of instructor in the School of Chemistry and Physics. Miss Ellen Warth will succeed Miss Childs as assistant professor of home economics.
 Trustees accepted an additional gift of \$1619 from the State Federation of Woman's Clubs, supplementary to their previous gift for a scholarship endowment fund.

It was also voted to continue South Atherton street over College property to Park Avenue, thereby affording a direct connecting link between the north and south portions of the town, a movement that should prove popular with residents in the Park Avenue section.

 The Allegheny Mountain excursion will be a ride of about a hundred miles through wild and beautiful parts of the Allegheny mountains. A modern equipped coal mine in operation will be visited where there will be a ride of one or two miles under ground in mine cars.
 The Snyder-Middleworth State Forest Park which is the largest body of original growth big timber in the State Forests of Pennsylvania comprises four hundred and twenty-five acres and has hundreds of visitors daily throughout the summer. This excursion is a ride through Centre, Mifflin, Snyder, and Union Counties giving one grand panorama of changing scenery.

Danville Trip
 On the last Saturday of the Summer Session, August 7th, there will be an excursion to the Danville State Hospital where there are more than sixteen hundred insane patients. The object of this excursion is to furnish students first hand information as to the causes, methods of prevention, and treatment of mental diseases and defects, for which Dr. Eike will conduct a clinical demonstration.
 There are many delightful places suitable for evening excursions and picnics. There may be some evening excursions scheduled, perhaps to the Bellefonte Aeroplane Field, but most evening trips will be arranged whenever fraternities or other groups make a request. This list of places suitable for evening excursions is suggestive, but is by no means complete.
