

**BUFFALO TO MEET RIFLE TEAM IN OPENING MATCH**

**Difficult Card Arranged for Season—Four Letter Men Return**

One of the hardest schedules ever attempted by a Penn State rifle team has been arranged by Lieutenant H. T. Miller. The riflemen may open their season with the University of Buffalo during the week after Thanksgiving vacation.

The prospects for the team are excellent, as four letter men are back from last year's squad. They are A. S. Burns '27, William Tuman '27, B. C. Seaman '27, and C. B. Pittchard '28.

Based on the record made last year Penn State is classed in the first division of college teams, being rated fifth of the colleges east of the Mississippi. The men for the first match will be chosen next week.

Practically all the teams that will be met were competitors for the national championship last year.
