draw closer than seven points. Unheralded and unsung, a crack City College of Detroit five came out of the west to administer a surprising, stinging 37-27 setback to Lion hopes last Tuesday. An early Penn State lead of 8-2 and 10-3 meant nothing to the fast-moving forwards of the visiting quintet and before the first half was over the westerners held a one-point 22-21 lead.
