Mahon started flashily against Ritchie Collins, Navy captain and two-year intercollegiate champion. For three rounds he battled along on fairly even terms with Collins only to have the decision go against him. Weintraub had a wider margin over Kofikoski in the next bout.

Filiger Drops First Fight

In his first battle of the year, intercollegiate champion Filiger showed that the long layoff occasioned by an eye injury will not be a serious hardship. Filiger was rather slow in getting started against the tall Horney, who conquered him last year, but in the third round the Blue and White lightweight rained punches all over his opponent and had Horney staggering around the ring, holding on to avoid a knockout. It was a tough fight to lose and Filiger's rally, according to observers, should have entitled him to at least a draw.

There was no question of supremacy about the remaining fights. Gearin, who is Navy's best bet in the intercollegiate tourney, won in the very first round. Grazier was out on his feet, and after counting two the referee stopped the bout. Wolf avenged the defeat in the next fight. The nimble Penn State welterweight crashed blows at will against Burke who succeeded in reaching his opponent exactly three times. Wolf almost floored Burke in the second.

Harrington's defeat at the hands of Coleman in the 175-pound fight was almost predicted. Bus was up against a fighter who is regarded to be on a par with Lyons, the wonderful Navy light-heavy who raised such havoc in intercollegiate ranks two years ago. Coleman won by a knockout in the second round.

Mahoney Surprises

Perhaps the biggest surprise of the meet was Roger Mahoney's clear cut victory over King, Navy's heavy. In his first year with the gloves Rog has shown remarkable prowess and should take Butler, the Pennsylvania heavy into camp Saturday. King was at Roger's mercy throughout the three rounds and just managed to escape an early demise in the opening round. From the first to the last gong Mahoney, using Wolf's left jab, punished King severely and saved his powerful right for the clinches.

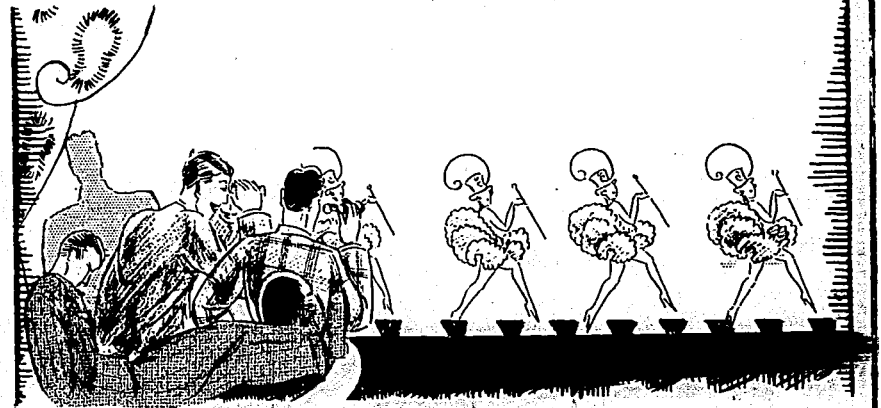

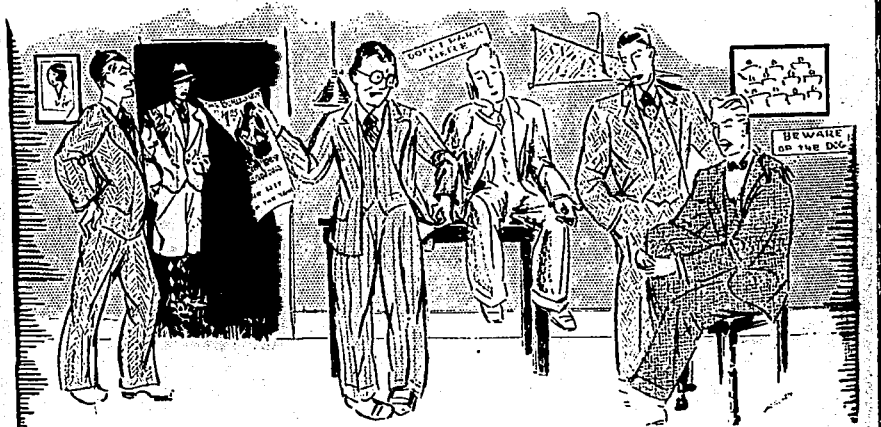
