

Governor Approves of New Appropriation Bill

(Continued from first page) Governor Fisher provided that the first building work from the appropriation fund should be the fitting of the upper floors of Old Main for classrooms. This however, will not interfere with plans concerning the reconstruction building nor the proposed hospital and men's dormitory unit.

Alumni Fund These buildings will be erected by the fund donated by Alumni and friends of the College. Bids were received for the proposed storehouse Saturday but have not, as yet, been considered.

The passing of this bill will, however, deprive the College of a part of its income through additional Senatorial scholarships and insurance to buildings and equipment but this a part which must be fulfilled in the advancement of Penn State's position as a College.

In concurring with Governor Fisher's decree, the Board of Trustees will appoint a special committee to consider the plan to be pursued in building operations after Old Main has been reconstructed.

Bond Issue The \$8,000,000 bond issue which has been proposed will come before the public-at-large in the elections in the fall of 1928. If this goes through, Penn State's building campaign will take on new life. One million dollars will be available annually for eight years for the construction and equipping of new buildings.
