

ELECTION OFFICIALS MAKE FINAL COUNT

Mollenauer Will Be On Student Council But Lewis Must Give Up Position

SPECIAL BALLOT WILL SETTLE TIES THURSDAY

After the compiling and publishing of the unofficial results of the class elections held Tuesday and Wednesday the Student Council committee composed of R. B. Donaldson '27, G. P. Lippincott '27, and A. S. Gorny '27, recounted the ballot and announced the official tallies.

Because of the change in curriculum made by W. A. Stone, who was elected president of the Class of 1930, R. F. Mollenauer will represent next year's sophomores in Student Council as a member of the School of Agriculture while S. H. Lewis who received the highest total in the Liberal Arts school will lose his chair.

Tie votes in the Schools of Engineering and Mining will necessitate new balloting in Engineering A and Old Mining buildings Thursday from nine until twelve-thirty o'clock in the morning and from one to four-thirty o'clock in the afternoon.

In the Class of 1929, C. A. Baumann, R. R. Cleland and S. H. Weaver received the same number of votes for Student Council from the School of Engineering.

P. F. Houserman '28 and J. R. Keim '28 are the candidates who caused another ballot in the School of Mining.

Installation of Penn State chapter of the Triangle, national engineering fraternity, will take place next year following the acceptance of Sigma Epsilon's petition to the national group. The prompt acceptance of the petition was actuated by the high scholastic standing of the local group and the efforts of Denn Sackett, an honorary member of the Triangle.

The Triangle is a national social-engineering fraternity and was founded in 1907 at the University of Illinois. Installation of the Penn State chapter will occur the second semester of next year. Consisting of twelve chapters, the organization is represented at leading mid-western universities including Illinois, Michigan, Purdue, Chicago, Wisconsin and Ohio State.

State men. Sands outdid Karback in the quarter-mile while Smith beat Offenhauer in the half-mile. Smith, staving off every spurt by Offenhauer, led the sophomore runner to the finish line in the time of 1:58 2-5.

Penn's trio of two-milers, Haskins, Fournier, and Reis, romped off with their specialty.

The hurdles were two all-Penn State events, Lerch, Sharp and Brownstein winning the low timber-topping sprint in the order named while Eggers led Lerch and Sharp in the high-hurdle event.

With a total of thirteen points, Al Bates was the individual star of the meet. Winning both the broad and high jumps, Bates also took second in the pole vault, clearing the bar at eleven feet, three inches. Mathias won second place in the broad jump.

Navy's strength was in the weight events and more particularly in the discus throw. The javelin throw fell to three of the Middies, McGary flinging the spear 164 feet.

Although not equalling his best performance because of slippery footing, Marian Ide, Nittany hammer heaver, broke the Navy record when he hurled the metal ball 154 feet 3 1-2 inches. Al Mathieu got third place in the shot-
