With the intercollegiate championships at Philadelphia but four days off Coach Nate Carlmell is preparing his men for the most important track meet of the year.

Coast Teams Favored While Stanford and Southern California are the favorites to fight it out for the championship, Penn State is ranked with Harvard, Yale and Cornell as one of the four leading teams of the East.

Ten and possibly more new champions will be crowned in the intercollegiate track and field championships this week. Of the hundreds of state athletes entered only five were title-winners in the fifteen events at Cambridge last year. Champions who will defend their crowns are, Cooke of Syracuse in the quarter-mile, Haggerty of Harvard in the one-mile, Dowding of Georgetown in the broad jump, King of Stanford in the high jump and Carr of Yale in the pole vault.

Runners-up in the various championship events are much more plentiful, there being eleven men who
