Although a few of the varsity team have left school to start summer work, Captain Phil Page, Bus Harrington, catcher and captain-elect for the 1927 squad, Styborski, Cy Langren, Mike Haines and others will remain to engage the stellar combine of yesterday.

Mike Palm May Play
Mike Palm '22, who captained the baseball team in 1923 and was an all round performer in the gridiron and track during his Collegian years, may be among the Lion batsmen who will meet the present varsity in the tilt Monday.

Hinkley Haines, baseball captain in 1921, basketball player and a member of the All-American football second team has also notified the Alumni office of his intended return as has Johnnie Reed, 1924 captain of basketball and a member of the baseball team for two years.

Other Stars Return
Other captains who expect to return are Sherry Miller, football leader in 1914 and Irish McIlwain, 1906 baseball director.
Earl Hewitt '03, who played football for five years, captaining the team in 1901 and making the second All-American team besides engaging in both varsity track and baseball will be back in the line-up.

Bucknell Confers Degree on Hetzel

President R. D. Hetzel received the degree of Doctor of Laws from Bucknell university on Wednesday morning at the annual commencement at that institution. The degree was conferred by President E. W. Hunt, of Bucknell university, upon authority of the faculty and board of the university.

The invitation to receive this degree was extended to President Hetzel last December before he took up his duties at Penn State. It was extended as a desire on the part of Bucknell to mark Doctor Hetzel's coming to Pennsylvania, and is especially appreciated by Penn State people as a highly courteous act on the part of one of Penn State's nearest neighboring educational institutions.

While he was president of the University of New Hampshire, Doctor Hetzel received the degree of Doctor of Laws from Dartmouth college in 1918, conferred by President E. M. Hopkins, and from the University of Maine in 1924 from President C. C. Little, who soon afterwards became president of the University of Michigan.

LION LACROSSERS END SEASON WITH FAST ONONDAGANS

Indian Line-up, Including Galaxy Of Speedy Stars, Plays Here Tomorrow

FATHER AND SON WILL START FOR NEW YORKERS

Reservation Men, With Clever Paul-Coached Team

When the peaceful populace of State College is suddenly aroused by a blood-curling war-whoop from the vicinity of New Beaver field tomorrow afternoon about one-thirty o'clock, it will be a sign that lacrosse activities have begun and that the battle between the Onondaga Indians and the Penn State team is in full swing.

Realizing the determination of the wild-tribe of Indian visitors, Coach Eric Paul has been preparing for the New Yorkers' invasion since the Penn tilt mainly by haring the tricks, methods and ability of the Reservation players and instructing his Nittany stickmen in the art of counteracting their peculiar tactics.

Indians Are Clever
It is certain that the Indians will arrive with the proverbial bagful of tricks that has marked their playing for years. Besides, the Lion mentor will have to cope with the speed, experience and well-known cleverness of the Nebrons.

Some of the ablest and fastest lacrosse players in the country are included in the Onondagan ranks. Johnson is one of the most powerful attack men for the visitors, having scored no less than eighteen goals in three games. His shots are all fast and underhand. Moreover, Johnson, Indian on home man, is the fastest man on the team—a 40-yard dash of splitting the century dash in ten seconds.

According to advance information Penn State's trio of attack men will have trouble in penetrating the Indian defense, especially the goalie, Johnson, who is considered one of the most spectacular in the country. He was instrumental in blanking the Lions in 1926. Buffalo Pierre, former student of Coach Paul, is the youngest and most promising man on the squad. At eighteen, he is considered one of the best college prospects in the East. He is six feet tall, weighs 180 pounds.
