ing, room for nurses and a combined X-ray and physio-therapy department with appliances for treating sprains, bruises and all minor injuries.

On the southwestern side of the building two porches, one on each floor, enclosed in vitra glass which permits the passage of the sun's ultra-violet rays, will be used as sun parlors.

The hospital will be absolutely fire-proof being supplied with a fire-escape, an elevator and an electric calling system.

Fraternity Contributions D. Rittenour estimated that the project will cost about ninety thousand dollars for the building alone, and several thousand more for equipment. It has been proposed that certain fraternities each furnish one room as a memorial, thereby defraying a great deal of extra expense for the College. When the building is ready for occupancy provision will be made making it compulsory for all cases of sickness to be taken there for observation.

In this manner it is thought that the amount of sickness will be greatly reduced.

A certain amount will be added each year to the entrance fees of every student to cover the expense of any medical treatment which he might receive during the term.

L. A. School Increases Correspondence Work

For the first time in Penn State's history, the Liberal Arts courses in correspondence, prepared under the direction of the department of engineering, are ready for distribution, it was announced yesterday by D. D. Henry '26, head of this section of the extension.

Chief among the courses are: business correspondence, high school English high school history, and a number of courses in accountancy. Other courses in Liberal Arts are in preparation and will be released at the first of the year.
