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In a letter to President R. D. Hetzel, Mr. Lazaron states that this subject is rather appropriate for a group of college students, many of whom are being introduced for the first time to the scientific interpretation of the universe

Commissioned as chaplain in the regular army he served until December, 1918. He was one of the four chaplains officiating at the burial of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington Cemetery, representing the Jewish people on that occasion. At present he holds in commission as major in the officer's reserve corps

Several years ago he went to the Holy Land to study the religious situation. From there he returned to eastern Europe. He is now on the American through central and south executive board of the Central Conference of American Rabbis.

With the Pennsylvania and Syracuse games now joyous history, the Penn State gridmen, armed with a new and powerful offense, are determined to continue the blazing trail with a victory over Coach Herb McCracken's strong Lafayette eleven when the rival institutions clash in the annual Alumni day game on New Beaver field tomorrow afternoon at two-thirty o'clock.

Emerging from the Orange encounter almost unscathed, the Lions will oppose the big maroon team with their strength practically complete. Tony Paneccon, fighting tackle, received a bruised hip and Captain Roepke stained his injured knee, yet both men are sure to start in tomorrow's game. Ricker, husky sophomore right tackle, has been ill for the past few days but will also be available for the Alumni day game

Substitute Stars Uncovered The substitute problem that perplexed Coach Bezdek at the beginning of the season when injuries disabled several promising men, has solved itself and proved itself an item of satisfaction to the entire group of mentors. Both Craig and Miller, reserve halfbacks, who were crippled by leg ailments, have recovered and shown considerable ability at carrying the ball during the short scrimmages conducted this week. Eddie Craig is threatening to displace some regular back with his scintillating line plunging by which he has scored more than once both on the varsity and reserve teams. Miller burst into the limelight Wednesday afternoon with several long dashes.

Whitmore May Play Bob Whitmore, Wyoming seminary star, has stirred much comment with his improved playing. Time and again, he has crashed through the substitute ranks to sprint for twenty-three or forty yards at a time. Bob is one of the fastest men on the squad and may replace one of the regulars before the game is ended tomorrow.

On the line, McAndrews and Hastings have been toiling instead of Paneccon and Ricker. Wolff's speed and form is improving daily. Roepke is playing a sparkling constant game and C. Langston is directing the Backs in a level-headed manner. Hannas continues to add power to his line bucking while the entire line is co-ordinating to form a fast moving force. Only the defense, which may still be improved, is lacking.

Lafayette Is Strong With only one defeat to mar a perfect two-year record and that lately sustained, the Maroon eleven will be sure to offer its share of opposition. With such backfield talent as the stellar Wilton and Chimenti at halfback posts, the clever Hanlon calling signals and the busley Guest playing the fullback position, the Eastonians present one of the most formidable of-

DICKSON WILL EXHIBIT ROMANESQUE STUDIES

Will Show European Sketches In Old Main Art Room, Starting Today

Prof. H. E. Dickson of the department of fine arts will have on display in Room 281 Old Main today and tomorrow morning, a group of water color paintings and pencil sketches which he made last summer while travelling through southern France and northern Italy

Since he made the trip chiefly to study the Romanesque style of architecture in southern France and to visit the outstanding art centers of Italy he, sketches which include some landscapes are mostly of an architectural nature.

His work include paintings of Carcassonne in southern France, Lake Como in northern Italy, Chateaux, a town in the middle of France, Rome and other places of beauty and interest.

Professor Dickson was on leave of absence last year and took his master's degree at Harvard in the spring. He is now assistant professor in the architectural department of fine arts.
