

Athletic Control Board Submits Annual Report

(The following is the reprinted financial report of the Board of Athletic Control for the year ending June 30, 1927.)

The Board of Athletic Control of The Pennsylvania State College here-with submits the Annual Report of The Athletic Association for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1927, as audited and certified by Patterson, Feele, and Dennis, Accountants and Auditors, New York.

The two main sources of income are receipts from sports through ticket sales and quotas, and from the Student Athletic Association membership fees. From the former \$108,482.83 were received during the year, and of this amount Football contributed \$98,088.91, the balance being accounted for from nine other sports, no receipts being recorded in Golf and Rifle. The corresponding figures of the previous year were \$128,747.36 from all sports of which Football, gross returns were \$118,458.86. This shows a falling off of \$20,264.53 which amount is almost identical to the loss incurred in football. The receipts from student fees were \$51,215.84 as compared with \$50,116.33 for the previous year.

The total gross yearly income from all sources was \$189,698.77 with current expenditures for the year running \$197,720.57, which leaves an expenditure over income, exclusive of cost of new developments, of \$7,840.80. Adding new development charged off account of completion of Concrete Tennis Court of \$1,551.86, makes a total deficit for the year ending June 30, 1927 of \$9,392.66. This together with previous year's deficit of \$5,502.19 creates a total association deficit of \$14,894.85. During the past year the concrete tennis court was completed at a total cost to the Athletic Association of \$3,696.70.

In the various sports football showed a surplus of \$28,923.73 as compared with \$41,997.28 of the previous year, and \$48,995.29 of 1926. The net deficit in other sports totaled \$18,816.74 as compared with \$44,942.31 in previous years, and \$12,605.03 two years ago. The total net deficit in all sports was \$19,893.01. The previous year this item was \$4,545.03, the difference being accounted for by the decline in football receipts. The net cost of maintenance of Athletic Fields, and Varsity Hall was \$21,364.62, which is almost identical to previous year's figures. The net expenditures in all other general association accounts was \$22,050.11, as compared to \$24,382.46 for the year ending June 30, 1926.

The status of the Athletic Association's pledge to the Emergency Building Fund is that \$15,000 has been paid against the subscription of \$110,000 leaving a remainder of \$95,000.

The Board of Athletic Control feels that in view of certain economies, resulting from action on Trustee Athletic Scholarships, and also the scheduling of the Notre Dame football game to be played on Franklin Field on November 3, 1928, the present deficit will be eliminated during the year 1928-29, and the Association will be in a position to give a substantial contribution again to the Emergency Building Fund.

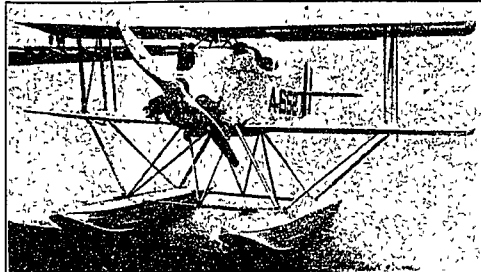
