PROMINENT RELIGIOUS MEN WILL GIVE TALKS

Character of Convention To Be Non-sectarian—Education Is Object of Meeting

With representatives from every college and university in the United States and Canada, the Tenth Quadrennial Student Volunteer Convention will be held at Detroit, Michigan, from December twenty-eighth to January first for a complete reconsideration of the basis of the Christian missionary enterprise.

This gathering which is inter-denominational and non-sectarian in character is the largest group of students assembled annually in this country, according to Y. M. C. A. Secretary Kitchener.

Convention Will Educate In reality the meeting will be a student Christian missionary convention, the object of which will be to educate and inspire an analysis of the present world situation and a search for the solution of recognized problems will be made together with consideration of the cooperative and opposing forces that operate internationally and inter-acially.

GOLDEN PANTHERS SWEEP TO VICTORY AS LIONS CRUMBLE

Wins Eastern Championship By Downing Penn State 30-0, in Final Game

TRIUMPH OF BLUE AND GOLD EARNS COAST TRIP

Welch, Booth, Hagen Batter Nittany Line To Register Four Touchdowns

Pitt's powerful Golden Panthers proved beyond the shadow of a doubt their claims to the gridiron championship of the East when they battered their way to a 30-0 victory over Beldef's ragged Nittany Lions in the annual Turkey Day encounter last Thursday.

With the much-discussed Coast trip always in view the Blue and Gold machine, at the height of its perfection, played superior football, bounding the Lion backs on every play and sweeping aside the opposing Cameron tide with an irresistible offense.

The contest was fiercely waged throughout the first period as the traditional opponents battled without score. Pitt's score came soon after the second quarter opened when Miller, substitute halfback, ran wide around the end from behind his goal line and was nipped for a safety by the alert Hagen. Long runs by Hagen, Edwards and Booth paved the way for a touchdown which the latter scored after a steady march to the finishing stripe. With the ball on Penn State's seven yard line, a second

Dr. Robert Dengler Will Translate Old Greek Botany Book

Announcement that "De Causis Plantarum," a Greek book on botany written in the ages when Greek was the prevalent language, is being translated into English by Doctor Robert E. Dengler, associate professor of Greek at Penn State is attracting nation wide interest.

There has been only one other book written by Theophrastus, known as the "Father of Botany" translated, and that, namely, the "Historia Plantarum." The rendering into English of the second work, however, by Doctor Dengler is well underway.

As a result of Professor Dengler's work there are now available the famous Greek views on the physiology of propagation in plants. It may be taken as showing the utmost that botanical scientists could offer in his time, about 2500 or 2100 years ago.

CHERRY'S RETURN WILL STRENGTHEN BACKFIELD

Booters Completely Vanquish Swarthmore—Fight to Tie Haverford

After furiously battling Haverford to a stalemate and completely routing Swarthmore by a record score, 11-0, during the past week, the Lion booters will attempt to preserve an un-mingled league reputation tomorrow when they encounter Navy on the Blue and Gold field.

This far this season, the Navy players have a record fraught with defeats and victories, which in itself gives little indication of the outcome of tomorrow's clash. Earl, in the season they vanquished Penn to the tune of 14-0 but later met successive defeats at the hands of Lafayette and Chicago. However they have a formidable eleven and one not likely to be out of Annapolis' turf.

Cherry Returns The Nittany team will be reinforced by the return of Captain Jim Cherry for his first game since the tilt with Lafayette three weeks ago. It will be his final career appearance under the Blue and White standard.

With the exception of Mousa Serry who after gaining unimpeachable points Monday was injured when he made a hard dive and clashed with Swarthmore players and goal post, the Lions will present a regular lineup to the Middies.

The forward line will be maintained by Marshall, sensational goal-kicker, Giffen, Jacobson and Lutz with Skonieczny, Serry and Giese at the line. In the halfback berth will be Rempo, Edgerton and James or Reed. Giese does not hold down his former center forward position, he may see service in the halfback line.

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
