(Continued from first page) the College, "by law, by tradition, by practice, by necessity and by every test that can be applied, is proved a public institution of higher learning." By these tests he also said, "Penn State is to Pennsylvania potentially if not actually, what the public colleges and universities in other states are to their respective Commonwealths. I say potentially because Pennsylvania has to date so seriously failed to properly develop this great and vital public asset. There can be no question as to the character of the institution. The confusion is entirely due to the failure of the State to endow it with sufficient substance and power to permit adequate public ministry. There is no field of investment open to the State of Pennsylvania that offers so rich a return in dividends of material wealth alone as is available through adequate provision for its State College."
